# DOVBUSH ROCKS: WHAT STONE GIANTS ARE SILENT ABOUT

#### PREPARE TO READ

#### 1. Get Students' Attention

This can be done in native language or English.

- Show students the pictures on page 6. Ask students what all the pictures have in common.
  - All the pictures represent Ukraine. (Students may guess that the pictures represent a place or country).
    - A pink Panama hat, like the one worn by Kalush Orchestra soloist Oleh Psyuk (winner of the Eurovision Song Contest, 2022). The pink Panama hat has become a symbol of Ukraine's victory at Eurovision, so people hope that the brightly colored hat will help us win another important victory for our country.
    - The Carpathian Mountains are mountains in the western part of Ukraine, one of the most beautiful regions not only in Ukraine but also on the entire European continent, famous for its nature, landscapes and mystery.
    - A mix of Ukrainian symbols such as the flag (yellow and blue), a stork, wreath, bread, and sunflower.
    - Borsch. Borsch is a symbol of Ukrainian cuisine, the first and only one to be included by UNESCO in the list of Intangible Cultural Heritage of Ukraine.
       CNN included borsch among the 20 most delicious soups in the world.

#### 2. New Words

- Write or display these words on the board.
  - o cave, surrounded, monument, figure, experience, border, stone, leader, folk, power

- First, help students learn the pronunciation of the words. You may use the recording of the story or an online dictionary.
  - o Have students record themselves saying the word.
  - They can compare their pronunciation in the recording with the dictionary recording.
- Next, review the meanings of the words.
- Give each student a copy of or display for the whole class the Matching activity sheet on page 7.
- Have students use the words by answering the questions in the next Connect activity.

#### 3. Connect to Students' Experience

- Divide students into pairs.
- Have them discuss the questions.
  - o Do you like exploring caves?
  - o How do you feel when you are surrounded by nature?
  - o Have you ever visited a monument? What is it called? What does it represent?
  - o Robin Hood is a mythical figure. Who is he? What did he do?
  - What kind of experiences do you enjoy while traveling to new places?
  - Who is a leader in your country that you look up to?
  - o Do you believe in the power of nature?
  - o Have you heard any folk stories related to mountains?
- Have some students share their answers with the whole class.

#### 4. Guess: What will happen?

- Tell students they will guess (or predict) what will happen in the story.
- Give each student a copy of the Making Predictions activity sheet on page 8.
  - Read the text in the first box. Tell students to guess how they think Dovbush will be connected to the rocks.
    - They should write their ideas in the cloud.
    - Have some students share their ideas with the class.
  - Read the text in the second box. Tell students to guess what they think will be in the caves and if it will be difficult to get them.
    - They should write their ideas in the cloud.
    - Have some students share their ideas with the class.
- After you read the story, you will return to this activity.

#### 5. More Vocabulary

• Introduce students to these words before they read or listen to the story.

- o echo a sound that repeats because it bounces off a surface.
- o **inner strength** the power inside you that helps you keep going when things are hard.
- o **spirit** the part of a person that is not physical, like their feelings and thoughts.
- o **follower -** a person who supports and believes in someone else's ideas.
- o **resilience** the ability to bounce back from difficult situations.
- o to spread to make something cover a larger area.
- o **refuge -** a safe place where you can go for protection.
- o sin doing something wrong or bad according to religious beliefs.
- o **rethink** to think about something again and consider making changes.
- o **resistance** the act of fighting against something or someone.
- o **freedom** the ability to do what you want without being controlled by others.

#### READ & LISTEN

#### 1. Identify and Stand

- Tell students they will listen to the story.
- Any time they hear the words *Oleska* or *Dovbush*, they should stand up.

#### 2. Identify and Mark

- Students will read the story.
  - You may give each student a copy of the story on page 9, display it to the whole class, or print the from the website.
- As students read the story, they should identify and underline the answers to the questions:
  - o How is Oleska Dovbush connected to the rocks?
  - What is in the caves? Why are they hard to get to?

#### RESPOND

#### 1. Revisit—Guess, Identify and Mark

- Ask students if they were able to identify and mark the answers to the questions while they were reading.
- Have students return to their Making Predictions activity sheet.
  - O What did the story say about how Dovbush was connected to the rocks?
    - They are named after him; his body is scattered there; his treasure is buried there.

- Have students write it on the sheet.
- Did students predict correctly? They can write yes or no in the box.
- Did anyone guess correctly? Was anyone close?
- o Repeat for the second question.
  - Treasure is in the cave; it is hard to get to because no one knows the password to the rotating stone.

#### 2. Story Map Graphic Organizer

- Tell students we can better understand ideas in a story by using graphic organizers.
- Give each student a copy of Story Map graphic organizer on page 10.
- Students should complete the graphic organizer individually or with a partner.
- The complete Story Map will look like this.



#### 3. Talk more about the story

- Divide students into groups of 3.
- Display the questions on the board.
  - o Did you like the story? What was special about it?
  - What part of the text would you like to read again?
  - What did it make you think?
  - o Do you think the rocks can really inspire people?
- Have students discuss the question in their group.
- When everyone has finished discussing the questions, have groups share their answers with the whole class.

#### 4. Check Understanding

- Give each student a copy of the Comprehension Questions activity sheet on page 11.
- Students can answer the questions on their own and then discuss with a partner or the whole class.

  - o Fill in the answers

#### **EXPAND**

#### 1. Relate to your country

- Have students research natural places and/or monuments in their country that relate to historical figures. They can
  - o prepare a short report about the monument
  - o complete a Story Map from p. 10 about the monument
  - o illustrate the monument and describe it to the class

#### 2. Use your imagination

- Have students write a short, creative work where they imagine they are speaking with Dovbush.
- Students can work alone or in pairs.
- Have students read aloud and role-play their writing.


